Head Master's Introduction to BWS Prize Giving 2021

2020-2021 was always going to be a year of 'firsts', for good or ill. Much of this was pandemic-driven; the division of the school site into bubble spaces for learning and free time, a later start to the school day that allowed rush hour to be avoided and sleepy teenagers to lounge a little longer in bed, the regular online assemblies and services (including Prize Giving), and the habitually highly ventilated, distanced, masked nature of the classroom environment. Given the logistical and organisational challenges it is a miracle that we were able to run a school on something approaching full throttle, with subject teachers covering a full curriculum in most cases. Many learning activities still happened. Those that could not were practical in nature - in music, drama, science and sport, where prohibition was a fact of life. Daily life felt the same, but different, but most of it happened for most of the time. History will record that we had to send home some boys in the Middle School for a short period towards the end of the autumn term, and that the Sixth Form had an early start to the Christmas Holiday (both due to positive infection cases), but school was pretty normal for almost all of our students for most of the time.

There were other notable firsts. Year 12 was the biggest ever, partly due to the first group of girls at Bishop's for 93 years. Just over 40 started with us in September 2020 and they have made a cracking year of it, despite the circumstances. We have already established ourselves on the Tennis and Netball circuits, the Choir has a new dimension and we have just appointed the first co-educational team of prefects, including our first Head Girl since the 1920's. The demographic bulge caused by the expansion to 160 intake in Year 7 will, this September, have swept through to Year 11. In the past academic year Bishop's number on roll was at around 1050, its biggest-ever; by the time that you read this we will be close to 1200, which represents the upper ceiling of growth.

Given that expansion and the exciting phase that the school is now entering it is hardly surprising that we said farewell to very few staff at the end of the academic year. There were four teacher retirements; after many years leading and inspiring all things Spanish, Frances Matthews has stepped back for a well-earned rest, although I suspect that she will still be tempted back occasionally to try out her Basque phrases in a classroom! Also retiring after a long and distinguished stint leading the French Department and Exchange is Helen Gosse. Feng Tang leaves her post at the helm of mandarin Chinese after an outstandingly successful stint, and Lulu Ward leaves the English Department after working part-time as a team member for a number of years. Mark Birkett and Tara Ward-Jones leave English and Biology respectively for other challenges beyond teaching, and we also saw the end of an era as David Peerless, our redoubtable and indefatigable Company Secretary retired. He leaves behind a taught governance machine now steered by Barry Smith. Finally, Andrew Gough leaves the Chaplaincy for retirement after three years at Bishop's. I am hugely grateful to all my colleagues for their hard work and vision over the past 12 tricky months.

The eye of the storm is a somewhat hackneyed term, but there is an inescapable relevance both to the recent past and the present. The turbulence of the summer of 2020, the relative quiescence of the autumn and then the lockdown, testing and restrictions of the Spring/Summer of 2021 have a temporal symmetry. My hope is that though normality will be elusive we may be emerging into a quieter period, where we can focus more on learning and development of educational provision rather than crisis management and mastery of government inspired guidance. That would be good!

Reflection from the School Chaplain

There is always a sense in which we embark into the unknown at the beginning of a school year. However, for most school years it is the details we are expecting to be unknown; the basic structure of the school day, week, term, and year are known. We know we will be playing rugby – we do not know the scores. We know we will be teaching towards our GCSE and A Levels – we do not know precisely which students will achieve which grades.

All these known unknowns were completely overtaken by Covid. During the year 2019-20 everything was thrown up in the air and we are still waiting to see what it looks like after everything has settled down again to the ... do we call it 'post pandemic normal', do we call it 'living with Covid normal'?

Last year the journey story I suggested we reflect on was that of the Jews taken into Babylonian Exile and leaving behind lots that had been destroyed. We could stay with that narrative and look at the return of the Exiles as a story to guide us through the coming year. The Jews who returned faced the rubble of their previous life which they had to rebuild.

As we embark on this return there will be plenty of rebuilding necessary. Approaching half the school will have little or no experience of pre-pandemic BWS. Many of the traditions and patterns of life that make Bishop's the great school that it is will have to be reestablished. There will also be the opportunity to introduce and develop that which is completely new.

We know that as we embark on this journey through 2021-22 that we are working from a very strong position. We have over 100 years of coping with difficulties behind us. The Jews, stronger as a people for what they had learned in Exile, returned and rebuilt Jerusalem. We can be confident in the knowledge that we can draw on God's support and guidance as we take John Wordsworth's vision of top-quality education forward into the unknown of a Covid changed world.

September saw a significant block of activity with expeditions running to catch up on all that was missed last summer, making the most of the beautiful countryside on our doorstep. Whether trekking through the Longford estate, along the byways or ridgeways on Cranborne Chase, the boys proved that sometimes you don't need to go too far afield to find an opportunity for an adventure. Finally, the most crucial and less visible link in our team is Mrs Jones who looks after all the online processes and is everpresent at camps to ensure the boys get the most from the experience. The programme would not run without such support and we continue to benefit from the experience that Johnny Durrant brings to our expeditions as a parent volunteer, an example to all of us in commitment to our shared community.

Given the significance of this year with the passing of HRH The Duke of Edinburgh, I feel that a nod to our volunteer base who share the passion and belief that the Duke instilled in creating and evolving the award is apt and reflects the value that our students gain participating. Exams: As you will see for the exam list a large number of pupils, and their peripatetic teachers, have continued to work hard this year towards exam entrances. Special mention is deserved for Marni Lai, who achieved a Distinction for her Diploma on the Harp, this is an incredible feat for someone in Year 12. Also, to Tanay Vajramani, who didn't just achieve a Distinction he was awarded 148/150 which almost certainly was one of the highest in the entire country. And to Benjy Jacobs who managed to achieve not one, but two, Grade 8 distinctions and he is still only in Year 8 so I am very excited about what the future holds for this young man.

The music department has been rather stifled this year with music making opportunities, but I have been amazed at the pupils' willingness to still play, practice and perform.

The Choir has continued to rehearse throughout the year despite the difficult circumstances. We welcomed ten new Year 7 choristers in September and I have particularly enjoyed our Friday morning sessions this year. We even managed to sing some carols outside the Playhouse at Christmas. Of course, we welcomed girls to the choir for the first time in Bishop's history, five Year

12s joined us in September and have been a wonderful addition. We began rehearsing in year group bubbles in September, moved to Zoom rehearsals in January, returned to bubbles in April and then started full rehearsals (whilst keeping social distancing between bubbles) in the Sports Hall.

We recorded a number of virtual performances for Founders Day, Prize Giving, Remembrance and Christmas services and managed a full recording of the choir in the Sports Hall for the virtual Cathedral Service as well. Whilst it has been frustrating and disappointing not to be able to perform fully and in front of an audience, I think we have managed to troop on regardless of restrictions and the pupils should be very proud of themselves. We can only hope that we are able to return to performing properly soon and many plans are in place for as soon as they are allowed.

Ensembles have begun, and stopped, and then begun again as the guidance continued to change throughout the Year. Mrs Hind has had excellent participation from the Year 7 and 8 ensembles, and they finished the year with a performance on the astro before the summer holidays. In the final term the new BWS Big Band started rehearsing in the Drama Studio which brought together boys from Years 7-13, they also performed outdoors before the end of the term on the lawn outside No. 11. It was particularly brilliant to see a number of Year 11s returning each Tuesday for these rehearsals long after they had finished for the summer. A-level singers continued rehearsing throughout the year as the Sixth Form remained a bubble, and they contributed many times to services with virtual and live recordings. This group gave arguably the musical highlight of the year, where 10 of the group travelled to Cornwall to give a lunchtime concert at the Minack Theatre, near Lands' End. We had the most amazing time with dedicated rehearsal time before the performance and the weather played its part giving us an almost Mediterranean afternoon for our performance.

Other notable achievements this year have been Tiger-Lily Jonathan joining the National Youth Jazz Orchestra, rehearsing online and travelling to London for Saturday morning rehearsals; Luke Passmore gaining a place in the West of England Youth Orchestra which is an auditioned and a highly competitive youth orchestra; William Ransome recorded an Organ Voluntary for one of St. Thomas' online services and many of the pupils continuing to be involved with Salisbury Area Young Musicians.

It would be foolish to consider that this had been a vintage year for music at Bishops, but it has shown to me in my first year that we have a wonderful crop of young musicians who are passionate, enthusiastic, talented and resilient and I am truly excited about the future of music here at Bishops. SPORTS AWARDS

PE and Sport Overview: When asked to write the Prize Giving report, the best bit is reviewing all that we have achieved in the last 12 months and despite a global pandemic we have achieved a fair amount which as always is testament to our boys and now also girls.

As a department the time allowed us to reflect and review our practice moving to a more holistic approach, not just focused on skill development in our various activities, but also through our key processes such as decision making, analysis and determination. We also had the pleasure of working with the Athlete Academy over the final 6 weeks of the summer to develop our Fundamental Movement Skills delivery in order to help all our students not just become better sports people, but better humans in terms of their everyday movement and actions. This whole adjustment in delivery can simply be summed up by our desire to allow our students and ourselves to be better people, better everyday.

We have continued to have great success in what we have been able to do over the last year, a lot of this would not have been possible without our various supporters who I refer to in my end of term reports, but as always a huge thanks to *Fawcetts*, *Blue Frontier*, *Girls Love Fit* and the *OWA* who have all contributed towards our delivery and continue to do so. For the next academic year I am also excited to have *Quilter Cheviot* on board as a major sponsor of our sports teams and who will be present on our training kit from September.

Summer 2020 saw a limited amount of sport take place as we faced lockdown restrictions. Thankfully come the Autumn term with restrictions in schools eased we were able to get back to some sort of sporting normality with our myriad of opportunities on offer through our games options including Aussie Rules and Lacrosse to complement the usual PE provision and Games options. Along with yoga on Tuesdays after school there was the option of squash at Chafyn Grove and Tennis at Salisbury Tennis Club.

The Autumn also brought our own BWS girls into Year 12. Perhaps not the start they envisaged, but a start nonetheless and we were very happy to welcome them without hesitation in the knowledge we could compete on a regional and national level.

Since joining, the netball girls have managed to play a couple of netball fixtures against Godolphin and Dauntsey's with a fuller list in place for 2021-22. Tennis was played in the National Championships Aberdare Cup losing to an excellent Talbot Heath, before also taking on Godolphin and then a mixed match against Marlborough. The girls have also had the opportunity to train in both cricket and rugby, as well as mixed lacrosse, most starting from scratch, but with the increasing popularity we hope to have teams in the next academic year.

Some of the girls also played their part in our only weekend fixture of the autumn for the lower years when they, along with the boys in our Sports Leaders cohort, organised and ran a Ready 4 Rugby tournament. This was a great morning and without the pressures of our usual weekend blocks, allowed the players to really express themselves.

The senior rugby side also managed a couple of Ready 4 Rugby Tournaments at Salisbury Rugby Club which paved the way for many of our seniors to get involved with men's rugby which has been a real positive, seeing them continue on the pathway within the sport.

Senior rugby was one of the only non-summer sports to get any fixtures in this academic year. Led brilliantly by the co-captains Charles Kantolinna and Tom Edmunds the senior players played out an enthralling Stayers v Leavers match to facilitate one last home game at Britford for the Year 13 boys. This proceeded a clean sweep with dogged performances against two of our fiercest rivals. Before the summer half term we travelled to Bryanston with an U17 side as well as a 1st XV, both sides put in huge shifts to run out winners, the U17 side with many on senior debut and the 1st XV winning without concession, always a pleasing result. Then two days later the 1st XV took on Marlborough again away and despite conceding first with a well taken intercept try, they showed huge spirit bouncing back to win 12-7 and see the Year 13 boys off in style before we saw them off with an impromptu rugby dinner that evening.

Summer 2021 should have seen us in South Africa with the Lions, but it was not to be. Instead we look forward to touring in 2022, led by the 2021-22 1st XV Captain Jack Pawson.

Once we got beyond Easter and things began to open up we were able to get back to some sense of sporting normality and it was no surprise that our students took to the fixture list with real desire and intent. I have already spoken of netball and rugby but we have also been fortunate enough to have athletics, tennis and cricket fixtures weekly throughout the summer term. The athletes as usual did not disappointment having committed to training throughout the term in Games and after school our Year 10 team went to Marlborough for a meet with some of the biggest independents in St Pauls & St Edwards Oxford and came away winners by some way. This same team then went to Abingdon in the National Schools Cup and once again won the meet by some margin, this time upsetting Northampton School for Boys. The Year 8 team also got in on the act this time around, a great showing from a year group who missed nearly all athletics this time last year. After all results across the country were in, the Year 10 team finished as 4th best county winners and 11th nationally.

At the time of writing 25 boys and girls had played tennis for the school this summer with notable victories over Bryanston and Marlborough. Victory also over Trafalgar with the Year 10 side allowed them to win their Division 2 group and progress to regional knockouts, a fate already guaranteed for the Division 1 sides at both Year 8 and Year 10 in the Autumn. For the first time in a while we have a senior boys team who like the girls went down fighting in their National competition, the Glanville Cup. Having navigated the first round they were eventually overcome by a strong Millfield side. However, with so many on the courts the future is very bright for BWS tennis, particularly with Hari Choudhury coming through the ranks in Year 9 with his victory in this year's Road to Wimbledon competition. Hari went to Wimbledon this summer for the National finals.

Cricket really came to life in the summer term and having trained in the hall all winter, we had the pleasure of taking on some of the best around, including Winchester College, Dauntsey's, Portsmouth Grammar and Marlborough. While the 1st XI struggled to get going, lower down the school there has been great strength in depth particularly at Year 10 and Year 8 level. Most impressively though the Year 9 side made the Wiltshire T20 final. Building a sport takes time, but the early signs are that cricket will soon be pushing the same heights as our other major sports.

This bid for success as well as greater opportunity for boys and girls will hopefully be buoyed by our bid to install an external all-weather surface at Britford lane. Originally the primary aim was for external cricket nets to allow players to train during the exam season when the hall is out of use, but that plan has now grown to make the area multipurpose. With a footprint near that of the hall we will be able to play netball, train for football and rugby as well as use it for cricket. A really exciting project that I hope with the help of the BWS Foundation, alumni and local business we can see come to fruition by the middle to end of 2022.

Squash and Polo have also featured on the fixtures calendar this term with fixtures against Bryanston in both. Golf is being lined up for the Autumn against Eton, who we have also picked up as a block fixture in the rugby. An Aussie Rules fixture has been mooted, lacrosse looks to explode in popularity and A level PE makes a return, with potential trips thanks to OWs lined up to Arsenal and Eton to explore certain aspects of the course. The breadth of opportunity at all levels in different activities is something I am most proud of at our school, and that as a state school we are able to offer so much.

Beyond BWS you may have seen Cadan Murley won the Premiership with Harlequins after a tumultuous year as a club and personally with injuries, a fine result and sporting story. Xav Hastings played for England U20 and has made the move to Hartpury for his rugby next year. Mike Bradwell Year 13 continues to represent the Philippines this time in rugby 7s. In athletics Theo Cochrane in Year 12 competed in the high jump final at the U20 and U23 UK National Athletics Championships in Bedford in June.

As you read this we will once again be in the throws of a busy autumn, with block fixtures against the best around and cup competition to look forward to at all levels. 2021-22 is set to be a bumper year, but 2020-21 lay the foundations for it and the simmering cauldron of BWS Sport, having spent most of the last year on the back burner, has been nicely seasoned and is ready to go.

Congratulations to all our prize winners, in particular Alex Branagan for the new award in Arthur Bowden's name for the person most improved in rugby. From his first game to last as a 1st XV player he is almost unrecognisable to the one who started, a real leader and character on and off the pitch. Also Kate Clewer the recipient of our Team BWS Values prize. Kate is always humble, respectful and seems to enjoy whatever she is doing be it netball, rugby or cricket. She has volunteered for nearly everything and shows real self-discipline in her organisation and resilience in her learning of new sports in a new school.

Finally thanks as always to all the staff and volunteers who make it possible. With our own physio clinic, video analysis and expert coaches we're always looking for that performance edge, but our real edge comes in the form of our students who are remarkable at all levels in their attitudes and endeavour to be better everyday. BWS Adventure: New excursions, new partnerships, new charitable links and a happy return to Great Yews for our first years at the close of the summer term. BWS Adventure has, inevitably, found a way to further opportunity and adapt in the current climate so that our students can benefit from engaging within a different classroom. Now more than ever, the value of resilience, confronting risk and experiencing unfamiliar environments is in the public eye and part of a skill set which will be in high demand as our young leaders enter the wider world...

Here at BWS the programme is thriving. September saw the continued success of the team-building days for the new tutor groups in Year 7 as they were challenged with various problem-solving activities, followed by fire-lighting and cooking skills, the latter of which will be put to the test in their end of year camp amongst the Yew trees of Longford... From March through May all of Year 8, one form at a time, completed a 12km hike around the Longford estate in a brand new venture aided in no small part by David Canty, the estate manager. Between the teams at Longford and BWS we have devised a number of routes, designed to provide a robust physical challenge but also to encompass a diverse cross section of the land and educate the boys as to the day to day and seasonal workings of the estate. We were also delighted to forge a new partnership with the charity Horatio's Garden, donating £510 from these hikes via donations instead of trip payment.

National Grand Finals. This is an amazing achievement as there were only 16 grand finalists in the Year 10 competition and 22 in the Lower School section. Theon Evans (10W) represented us with a rousing and powerful performance as Henry V and Toby Ransome (9M) brought comedy to the event as he performed one of Bottom's monologues from 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. Both were not placed, but received glowing individual feedback from the esteemed judges. I am exceptionally proud of both and them. (Mrs M Gordon, Head of Drama)

Geography Club and Geography Society: Face to face Geography Club returned this term. It has been a joy to see the students sharing brilliant ideas and playing top trumps and other map and flag-based games in our current lunchtime location, The Chapel. During both periods of online school, Geography Club moved on to Teams, we had regular Teams meetings and currently have over 140 members on the team sharing quizzes, ideas and amazing geographical facts. An especially inventive Year 9 student started a competition after Easter and has spent hours creating some very challenging weekly quizzes to share on the team. Geography Club started in 2015 and is open to all students at Bishops. Students from Year 7 right the way through to Year 13 attended this year and it is always great to see older students helping younger ones (and vice versa!!).

Geography Society also has a good following on Teams, links to topical and relevant articles as well as dates and information for online lectures and webinars are regularly posted by both students and staff to keep everyone up to date with current affairs. Will Gande, the Geography Prefect organised some excellent speakers. Damon O'Brien from APBMer talked about his career in Oceanography and Ian Coady discussed International Development. Both speakers talked about studying geography and where it can lead. There are already plans forming about more visiting speakers for next year. (Mrs F Jones, Head of Geography Club)

The BWS History Society has had a great year, albeit a bit disrupted. Despite the pandemic restrictions enforced throughout the year, the History Society's plans and ideas were not curtailed; it continued to have an integral role within the BWS societies, helping to encourage more people to develop an understanding and appreciation for history. This is down to the speakers with whom we work hard to organise talks. Over the past year, there have been some incredibly interesting and insightful speakers who have thankfully agreed to deliver their talks via Teams, making it accessible for more people across the school and other local schools, such as Salisbury Sixth Form College and South Wilts Grammar School. Our predecessors, Olly Randall and Mark Jones, organised some incredible talks from distinguished professors and academics, such as Professor Ian Thatcher's 'Stolypin's Iand reforms' and the introduction to ancient Roman myths, legends and history by Dr Amber Gatrell. Inspired by the fantastic speakers last year, we organised a

talk by Anthony Seldon, a renowned historian for his work on the history of the office of the Prime Minister. He gave an insightful talk about the role and the shifting power dynamic between the prime minister and the monarchy, from Walpole to Johnson. Olly and Mark also helped to lighten the lockdown mood by continuing to post articles on our blog and by introducing the Horrible Histories song contest for the first year, which was a huge success. As this year's co-chairs, we are determined to continue the song contest to encourage more people to join the History Society and give the Charles II song another chance at winning!

With the summer holidays close in sight, we are now both very excited to begin planning the talks for the next school year; hope to continue the current system of having half of our talks related to our curriculum and the other half on requested topics by our members and other students in the school. We hope, next year there will be many more talks for those taking A-Level history, or those who are just simply interested to attend. Congratulations go to our Head Boy Jake Kneale who won the Youth Portfolio Category of **Young Landscape Photographer of the Year.** Jake was also commended in the youth black and white category.

Politics Society: 2020 is probably the year that will define this decade or perhaps our generation. We finally left the EU, Boris Johnson set off to Build Back Better, Covid 19 came and turned everything upside down and Donald Trump lost the Presidential election to a rather less exciting, albeit more predictable and somewhat less controversial, Joe Biden. The Politics Society picked up at a pace once school started again in September.

Our first talk was with Romsey MP Caroline Nokes and took place in the Sixth Form Common Room with Ms Nokes' face projected onto the whiteboard as she was unable to attend in person. Everyone was amazed by the success of our conference calls with unexpectedly high levels of engagement and the sense that we were able to communicate directly with our speakers. Sir Desmond Swayne, MP for New Forest West, was a highly engaging speaker and we thoroughly enjoyed his talk and his contentious views on government policy during the pandemic. He is a critic of Boris Johnson within the Conservative Party and he debated with the society well, especially over some highly controversial topics such as race.

As well as a record five MPs this year, we also had a range of academic speakers too. Our first was Dr Peter Allen, from Bath University, who gave a fascinating talk about representation in democracy. Perhaps most memorable was Exeter University professor, Ross Carroll, who gave a talk on political comedy and satire. His talk ranged from hate crime and Charlie Hebdo to the Simpsons and then onto the impact of our future PM Boris Johnson's

appearance on BBC's 'Have I got News for You'. Professor Carroll's talk gave a thought-provoking account of the history of political satire but also how it is used today, for better or worse, and whether it is actually good or bad for politics. The blend of politics and comedy is much more complex an issue than any of us had thought.

Top human rights lawyer and barrister Eric Fripp gave another evening talk which inspired the whole society to consider studying law. He also addressed the rights issues surrounding Covid and the citizenship claims of Shamima Begum. Our most notable speaker was undeniably Sir Jeffrey Donaldson MP from the DUP. His evening talk on MS Teams was fantastic. His intimate knowledge of Northern Irish affairs and the functioning of Westminster was incredibly interesting. The whole society was left with a far greater understanding of the politics in Northern Ireland and its history. One could not help but feel sympathy for those from both sides of the religious divide who, like Sir Jeffrey, were profoundly affected by the Troubles. The society has been incredibly fortunate to have had such a high calibre of speakers this year.

Finally, our US election day breakfast was a hit. On the morning of November 4th, the whole society gathered before school to eat breakfast and watch the most anti-climactic election results ever come in! First thing in the morning, it seemed as if President Trump may have won! However, by the time lessons started, and our breakfast was over, Biden began taking states like Pennsylvania as postal votes were counted. Although nothing conclusive took place over breakfast, it was fantastic to have so many students come to discuss politics over coffee and (some burnt) toasted waffles.

We managed to run 14 talks this year using both the Conference Call and evening MS Teams formats. Covid 19, for all the endless problems it has caused, has possibly transformed the society for the better. We are now able to communicate with speakers from across the country, including Northern Ireland, Cambridge and London and perhaps different countries, if the next committee dares to try. (Tom Tennett, Year 13, Politics Society Chair)

The Chaplaincy: Covid restrictions hit the BWS Chaplaincy very hard. There has not been a service in either the School Chapel or the Cathedral since February 2020.

As with much else in life, the Chaplain had to move online. Regular 3 minute Chaplain videos have been produced which the boys then watch in their form rooms during tutor time. The Cathedral services had to move online with readings, prayers and address being filmed in the Cathedral; and excellent contributions from the choir filmed in school chapel. These again have been watched by the school in their form rooms and Sixth Form in larger spaces.

The lunchtime chaplaincy activities, which were growing nicely and planned to expand to a third lunchtime, were lost due to a combination of the shortened lunch break and the inability to mix boys from different year groups. The 'Big Questions' group moved on to MSTeams which has kept some contact going through Covid restricted school.

The diocesan links I was beginning to establish were also put on hold as so much of the Church of England closed down and moved online. The Cathedral appointed a minor canon for youth in February 2020 and he is keen to be involved in BWS. Through the year he contributed two videos for the chaplain slot as a start in this process.

My move to BWS was as a step towards retirement. I am now 66 and this is an appropriate time to move on. There have been some positive developments in the chaplaincy during my 3 years in post; although very obviously Covid restrictions drastically curtailed this during the past 18 months. My replacement is Rev Dr Stella Wood who will be taking a full-time role in the School. She is a very experienced school Chaplain and someone well established in Salisbury diocese. This should mean that the Chaplaincy can quickly rebuild and develop positively in the future. (Rev. A Gough, School Chaplain)

Sailing Club: For the first time since October 2019, on Tuesday 18th May 2021 at 1600, eight Year 7 boys loaded themselves onto one of our minibuses and I drove them down to Blashford Lakes near Ringwood where they were to embark on the first six weeks of the Royal Yachting Association dinghy sailing course at the Spinnaker Club. We were met by the two instructors and, after they had changed into their sailing gear, for about half an hour they were given some verbal instruction, safety tuition, followed by some practical instruction on how the boats are rigged. This left an hour's sailing time on the first week. We usually arrive just before 1630 and (try to) leave by 1815. During the remaining 5 weeks, more time was spent on the water and the boys had about 75 minutes sailing every week; maybe that should read on and IN the water, as the boys have to practice capsizing and righting the boat as part of the course. The boys always thoroughly enjoy the course, so much so that we have difficulty sometimes getting away on time.

These boys will have the opportunity of completing their RYA1 certificate in September when we hope they can be joined by a few beginners. Thank you for the enthusiasm of the boys and the support of all the parents. (Mr J Browning, Sailing Club Coordinator)

BWS A level outcomes August 2021

This year, like last summer, is unusual when it comes to most things and exam results are no exception. The cancellation of the formal exam sessions meant that the subject grades for each student were arrived at via a different route. Though the finals grades were still awarded by the exam boards the grades were a distillation of various different forms of assessment through each A level course, with the greatest weight being given to work that was carried out later in the courses and under high levels of control (ie under supervised conditions in school). The assessment procedures were subject to rigorous quality assurance, both within school and by each exam board, and so we can be confident that the grades awarded to the candidates are an accurate reflection of their ability.

Headline figures are what Heads of schools invariably fixate on in August, and this year's outcomes were exceptionally strong. Much more important however are the individual stories of students who have coped with everything that the pandemic has thrown at them and come through so strongly. Our boys in Year 13 have a very exciting time in front of them - almost all will be starting courses at competitive universities in a few weeks' time with the prospect of a world that is opening up to opportunity once more. I wish them all good fortune as they take their first steps in the world beyond BWS.

BWS GCSE outcomes August 2021

The collateral damage wrought by the pandemic on education over the past two years will have varied from school to school, but in all cases will have been considerable. In 2019-2020 as much as 14 weeks of classroom time was lost, and in the following year perhaps another 8 weeks. Despite the facility of digital learning, the innovation of teachers nationwide and the determination of young people to stay on board, that type of incursion to face to face learning will have had a dramatic impact. At Bishop's the effects will have been less than elsewhere, as we were operating live lessons from very early on and subject departments were able to deliver a full range of syllabus content. The grade allocation by teachers in May/June, was a rigorous process of evidence gathering and holistic assessment; the nature of the assessment varies between departments, but in every case our boys will have been allocated grades based on their mock result and/or assessment data gained during the latter stages of their GCSE course.

In 2020-2021 our Year 11 boys have worked hard and done well in adversity. Their overall grade profile was very strong throughout, and the vast majority have stayed on with us for their Sixth Form education.




