

Art, Craft and Design

AQA Specification



General information:

Art is a creative subject in which students will respond independently to themes and questions. You will present your investigations in a sketchbook which is used to visually articulate the understanding and context of your work, researching artists and information appropriate to your practice. You will have the opportunity to realise your work and curate an exhibition as a group. Students will also be given the opportunity to visit London Galleries and go on a residential trip to broaden your depth of experience - we have previously visited New York, Florence, Rome and Paris. These trips are a vital learning resource they inspire and inform ideas and responses, developing students understanding of their subject in a wider context. You will have the full support of an experienced team of practitioners within their respective disciplines alongside a dedicated technical support team.

Course content:

The course is designed to develop your ability as a young Artist, questioning and reflecting on themes that will initially be set for you. The course will allow you to pursue and develop an idea creatively and confidently with the support of expert teaching staff. Your initial project will be based on the theme 'Structures'. This will start with a focus on drawing techniques and ways to develop a personal response to the theme in a short intensive project that will give you a comprehensive understanding of the assessment objectives. You will also explore digital art, learn how to use Photoshop and Illustrator and also look at photography and digital editing. You will then independently work in response to a theme from a selection of visual and written starting points. We will work together to ensure you understand the expectations of the subject and prepare you for your A level.

How is the course taught and assessed?

Component 1: The Portfolio, worth 60%, which you will start at the end of year 12. This will be supported by a written assignment to contextualize your investigation (1000-3000 words). The course concludes with Component 2: An externally set Assignment, worth 40%, to be completed in the February of Year 2.

You will be assessed against the following objectives:

ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVE 1:

Develop ideas through sustained and focused investigations informed by contextual and other sources, demonstrating analytical and critical understanding.

ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVE 2:

Explore and select appropriate resources, media, materials, techniques and processes, reviewing and refining ideas as work develops

ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVE 3:

Record ideas, observations and insights relevant to intentions, reflecting critically on work and progress.

ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVE 4:

Present a personal and meaningful response that realises intentions and, where appropriate, makes connections between visual and other elements.
