BWS GUIDE TO APPRENTICESHIPS



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The basics

An Apprenticeship is one of the options open to you after Year 13. In essence, an Apprenticeship allows you to enter the workplace, earn a salary (or at least get paid) and gain a qualification at the same time. Duration varies on the level - for example, a degree Apprenticeship will take between 3 and 5 years.

Apprenticeships are available at different levels depending on the offered qualification – exactly the same as academic qualifications. Thus, A levels are a Level 3 qualification as is an Advanced Apprenticeship.

In planning your future, you will ideally want to investigate Higher or Degree
Apprenticeships at this stage, but you can also consider Advanced Apprenticeships, particularly if there is a very different, practical skillset involved.



Your employer will allocate time within your working schedule for you to study. Examples are day release, where you study one day per week, or block release, where you work for a period and then study for several weeks, then return to work.

Apprenticeships are only available in vocational areas as the qualifications are specifically linked to a job role.

Therefore, you will not be working towards a degree in geography or English but those such as marketing digital solutions. business administration. of the attractions One particularly a degree apprenticeship, is that you do not pay university tuition fees. It is not the same experience as attending full-time, as your study will mostly distance/online learning with perhaps some short-term attendance.

Obviously as an Apprentice is studying on a part-time basis, the qualification will (usually) take longer to achieve



Degree Apprenticeships began to emerge seriously about 10 years ago and are continuing to increase in number and availability. They typically take 3, 4 or usually, 5 years to complete. A growing number of employers are offering them, such as the Bank of England, BT, the BBC, JP Morgan, Siemens, Jaguar Landrover etc., but you will need to be persistent, organised and research thoroughly as entry is highly competitive and the recruitment process is challenging. There may be initial tests, assessment centres, telephone and panel interviews. Your application will need to be well-prepared and carefully tailored for the organisation you are applying to. That said, help and guidance is available throughout the process. This is a great option to consider particularly if you are keen to get started in the workplace.



Vacancies

Apprenticeship vacancies occur at any time, although January to April can be said to be the peak period for those with a fixed September start. Some close quickly so it is important that you register your interest and regularly check to see what's available. Prepare or update a comprehensive CV so that all necessary information is to hand.

A skills audit is also useful in preparation so that you can easily match your skills to what is being asked for (sometimes called a person specification). However, don't be put off from applying if your skillset does not match exactly.
