



# Bishop Wordsworth's School

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Dear Parents/Guardians

I watched a short video over the weekend of a former coach called Steve Black or Blackie. I was lucky enough to be coached by him while at Durham and he was innovative, but also kept things simple. He also always seemed to focus on the positive and the human behind the sports person was at the front of all he did. It prompted me to think and reflect on my coaching.

In short, it made me think about how much our sports people put in, on top of their academic studies. They are not at BWS to play sport, they are here to make the next step on their journey. Sport contributes to that, but to do it they have to sacrifice additional time and make lifestyle choices that enable them to compete on the level that they do. After what has been an exceptionally long term, they should all be immensely proud of all that they have achieved and how they have grown as individuals both on and off the sports field.

I would also like to thank all our parents who support the students. I realised on the frozen touchline at Eton this weekend whilst trying to process the matches and shimmy the boys along, I rarely stop to speak with our wonderful support. It is a real pleasure to see our touchlines regularly full of parents and more so on frozen away days. So, thank you, your ongoing support is hugely appreciated.

This term one fortnight in particular stands out in terms of sporting performance and participation. From 6 November to 20 November, we had 42 fixtures played across 8 different sports with all years involved. The breadth of sport on offer and standard being played, be it at a participatory level or pushing more toward performance, is exceptional.

This fortnight was special to me and had a certain symmetry to it as our U12D rugby boys (some of whom may go on to be 1<sup>st</sup> XV players) travelled to Millfield for their first matches, many of whom having never played before, while the 1<sup>st</sup> XV after a torrid season falling on the wrong side of the score line, earned their first victory against Pangbourne.

The fortnight was made more pleasing however with our senior football winning a memorable ESFA R3 match against Thomas Hardy School on penalties. The senior boys and girls' tennis sides recorded notable results topping their groups. The KS3 squash team upset National Championship favourites Wycliffe to earn their place in the next round and cross country ensured three teams would progress to the National Final in Leeds. Finally, the girl's rugby travelled to Milton Abbey where they played their first ever full sided rugby match, building an 8-person scrum in the changing room before kicking off!

On average 42% of the school student body has participated in a sporting fixture this term, with Year 9 paving the way with over 50% of the year being involved. With the main football and basketball seasons to come next term and then our summer provision, including cricket, I would hope these numbers will increase again as more young people find their sport.

## **Badminton**

Simon Woodhouse continues to coach on a Monday morning with our club and county standard players. After Christmas we hope to open this up to Y7 for anyone interested. Off the back of 6F Games we played a participatory friendly with Godolphin which sounded great fun and we hope to repeat in the new year. The KS3 and KS4 sides won their local round of the school games, and we hope there will be a county round, although that is to be confirmed. If not, we may look to host the best schools from each local competition.

## **Basketball**

The senior and U14 sides have encountered tough EBBA groups against basketball heavy weights Millfield, Richard Huish College, and Bristol MET, while the U16s have had a more favourable draw overcoming Orchard school. Thanks to Mr Duckett's insight, the U13 for the first time have been entered into the Junior NBA competition with a clean sweep in their first triangular with another coming before the end of term.

## **Cross Country**

Our senior boys secured 8<sup>th</sup> place in the National Finals of the ESAA Cross Country Cup, with our senior girls 22<sup>nd</sup> and inter boys 21<sup>st</sup>. Another outstanding set of results from the runners who also came out on top across the board at the local school's races as teams with some notable individual performances and await results to see if they have been selected for the Wiltshire trials in the new year. Thanks as always to Mr Griffey who gives up his free time to run the cross country and support our sports teams.

## **Football**

As already mentioned, the senior football side has had quite the season so far with 8 matches played and only two losses to Reading Blue Coats and Millfield in the last 32 of the ESFA National Competition. They continue their run in the County Cup after Christmas as well as the Poole Schools 6<sup>th</sup> Form Cup which we entered this year. We also have a 2<sup>nd</sup> XI at senior level who play their ESFA R2 match on the last Friday of this term. It has been great to see our footballers really push on this year with an excellent team culture and verve about them. With many of them in Y12 and a strong Y11 group coming through, the future of BWS football is bright. Thanks to Mr Edney, Mr Green and Mr Owen for working with them this term as well as our sports assistant Isaac.

## **Netball**

The netballers have kicked on this year with great team cohesion and style under the guidance of Mr Hole. With two teams now running we have more girls than ever playing, with strong results against SWGS and plenty more to come in the new year. It is sure to be an exciting season for the girls despite the heartbreak of an admin error leading to their exit from the county competition having previously thought we had made regionals. Credit to the girls for their resilience and attitude after such terrible news.

## **Rugby/Rugby 7s**

The U14s have been the standout side of the term with eight victories from ten against notable opposition including Whitgift and Canford. However, as we always say, sport is far more than about the results and we focus on the performances and standards we hold ourselves to on and off the pitch. It has been a tough term for some teams, but the players attitude and commitment has been unwavering and with over 350 of our students playing, it has been another great season against some fantastic opposition with many lessons learnt and memories made.

## **Squash**

The KS3 squash team is an exciting prospect this year with two boys in the top 20 nationally and they stand an excellent chance of going deep in their competition. Having already knocked out one of the favourites, we look forward to seeing how they progress in the National Championship after Christmas against Sevenoaks and Truro. The KS5 team has a wealth of experience and after losing in their initial group stage will also compete after Christmas but in the plate against Peter Symonds and Cheltenham College.

## **Tennis**

The term started with our A and B teams playing knockout tennis rolling over from last summer. The A teams had tough away draws across the Southwest and were unable to progress to Regional Finals this year. However, our B teams made their Regional Finals with the KS3 boys finishing 3<sup>rd</sup> and KS4 finishing 2<sup>nd</sup> overall. The senior boys and girls currently sit atop of their respective groups going into the new year and following their performances last year, we earned the rank of 17<sup>th</sup> best tennis school in the country.

Locally it is exciting to see two clubs headed up by former BWS students with Jamie Barry and his family running a great program out of Riverside Tennis Club and Rory Smith having recently taken over the helm at Salisbury Tennis Club with some great innovative ideas and projects in the pipeline.


