#### The Economics of Ideas

Tim Harford's double publication Fifty Things that Made the Modern Economy (volumes 1 and 2) is an excellent read, always full of interest and with snappy, concise, short chapters that you can either dip into or read as one. You'll get a real sense of what drive innovation in modern economies and crucially, where good ideas come from (often drawn from counter-intuitive thinking!)
